First-class students get cash prizes

The four students who graduated with first-class degrees in the 9th graduation received cash prizes of between Shs. 1, 000, 000 and Shs. 500, 000 each. Mr. Stuart Timothy Akua received a cash prize of Shs. 1, 000, 000 as the overall best student in the Cavendish University 9th graduation held on May 28.

Mr. Akua graduated with a Bachelor of Public Health, scoring a total Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of 4.95. Ms. Winnie Nakibuuka was the best female student with a total CGPA of 4.89. She graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in International Relations and Diplomacy. The other students are: Mr. Kamal Yousif Anur who graduated with a Bachelor of Business Administration and Mr. Emman-

uel Bigirimana who graduated with a Bachelor of Laws. They got CGPA of 4.8 and 3.95 respectively. They each received cash prizes of Shs. 500, 000. Mr. Akua said that working with the local communities of Iganga district on public health issues made him to work hard. He also said that: “The desire to understand concepts and contextualizing the knowledge acquired has been a driving force to studying hard.”

Ms. Nakibuuka a beneficiary of the Cavendish scholarship grant said that hard work contributed to her excellence. “I managed to excel academically because of the commitment I had and knowing what I wanted, but in all, I thank God,” Ms. Nakibuuka said. Born in the family of seven, Ms. Nakibuuka said that this is the second degree in their home.

Three Cavendish students attain MCI media fellowship

Three Cavendish University journalism students were among the 26 students from different universities in Uganda who qualified for the five-day media fellowship training.

Ruth Omar, Faith Kemigisha and Sandra Racheal Cope were the 2019 Inter-University Media Challenge award-winning journalism students from Cavendish University who qualified for the training.

The other students were from Kampala International University, Uganda Christian University, Kampala University, and Makerere University among others.

The training which started on February 28th at J- Frigh Hotel Makere Kikoni is organized by the Media Challenge Initiative (MCI).

MCI usually organizes special training for Inter-University Media Challenge award-winning journalism students. The training is aimed at equipping journalism students with more practical knowledge to become the next generation of journalists in media. Asked why MCI organizes annual Media Challenge Fellowship Program, Mr. Abaas Mpindi, head of the Media Challenge Initiative Mpindi said: “Media Challenge Fellowship Program was born of the idea of building the next generation of journalists and with that we were hoping to identify talented and passionate cadres of young people from Universities that we can begin to groom and give them time and space to think creatively but also to act aggressively on sharpening their skills and sharpening their talent to become the next multimedia journalists or what we call ‘a one woman-

one man army journalist.”

Mr. Mpindi also added that: “The MCI staff has not been just giving awards to these students and sending them back home but provided a big platform for these individuals to get hands on skills and advanced media training.”

The content of this year’s training is mainly on the: role of journalists today; goal setting and online journalism; the intersection between media, democracy and development; understanding and reporting on social justice; understanding and applying the practice of solutions journalism; developing story ideas, angles and news writing for print or online media; story packaging for TV, editing and story production; and photojournalism.

The trainers were mainly media experts from Uganda’s leading media houses like; Mr. Canary Mugume and Mr. Raymond Mujuni from NBS TV, Mr. Arnold Segawa from NTV, Ms. Carol Ariba from New Vision, and Mr. Maurice Mugisha from UBC TV. Others were Ms. Carol Beyanga from Daily Monitor, Ms. Linda Kagechi from 256 Media, and Mr. James Akena from Reuters.

MCI staff like Mr. Abaas Mpindi the MCI CEO, Mr. Antonio Kitembo the Head of Operations, Mr. Ivan Kimuli Kigozi, and Mr. Mark Muggaga were also among the trainers. Mr. Mpindi, said that this was the third class of fellows and hoped for the best in 2020. Ms. Ruth Omar a trainee from Cavendish University was happy to attend the training. She said: “I am very

proud to be an MCI Fellow because it has given me a new identity and opened huge doors for me to places I never thought I would get to.”

Mr. Mpindi is, optimistic that the trainees will perform well in their journalism career paths. He said that the sky is the only limit at the MCI and they are moving all their forces to building the next generation of journalists that can impact, change, and lead the community to an era of knowledge and awareness.

Ms. Omar thanked MCI for the great work of training and imparting in her the most needed skills in the field of journalism. She plans to start an on-line publication for self-employment. There are more trainings ahead, as the graduation for the fellows is planned for July 25, 2020.

The two students were awarded for their innovations in the Uganda entertainment industry. Mukwaya is the Producer of the new TV series *Kyaddala* which airs on NBS Tv, a show that has transformed the face of real-life drama on TV.

Kyaddala is a pan-African television drama series created for Reach a Hand Uganda. Set in a present-day high school life, *Kyaddala* a Luganda word for “It’s Real”, focuses on real life social issues that affect young people across Africa and their attempts to overcome those issues. The series features actors and actresses from Uganda, Kenya, Rwanda and Nigeria.

Speaking to this newspaper, Mukwaya said that the prize was a surprise to him. “I thought we were going to be given plaques but I was overwhelmed by the cash prize,” Mukwaya said. He also added that: “This is something outstanding and very motivational to students to not only focus on education but also be innovative so as to make a difference.”

Kyomugisha who is TV host at Magic 1 and the main actress in the *Kyaddala* TV series said that it was

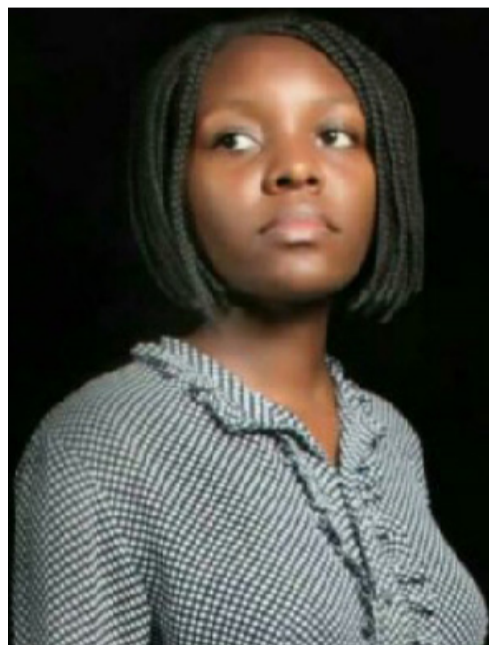

Embrace Cavendish graduation model

With many countries and institutions in lockdown because of the Novel Corona Virus, learning might never be the same again anytime soon. The World Health Organisation (WHO) predicts that the virus might be with us for more than two years. So, we need to learn to live with it.

With this, more innovation is needed in the field of education to support learning. Cavendish University has thus set a record by holding the first scientific and virtual graduation in Uganda. By the time of the lock in March, some universities in Uganda were already preparing for graduation but that is not the case now. Their students now are not sure of how and when they will graduate.

According to Prof. John Francis Mugisha, Cavendish University Vice Chancellor, holding scientific and virtual graduation will enable students obtain their academic documents to be able to secure jobs, promotions at the work place, job security or pursue further education and make contributions to the world.

Many universities in Uganda should, therefore, embrace this new model of graduation as a way of controlling the spread of the Novel Corona virus. Education institutions and students should accept the change and adapt to it.

With many countries in E. Africa still registering increase in the number of COVID19 patients, there is a lot of uncertainty about when the region will be free from the Corona virus.

In order to avoid students' over stay in the universities waiting for the 'normal' graduation of big gatherings, universities should change focus and copy the Cavendish model. This model may soon be the only way to go in many universities across the world.

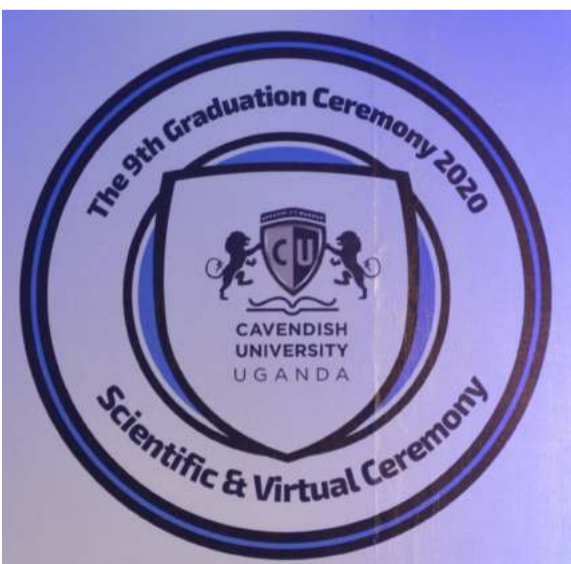

Cavendish holds first virtual graduation in Uganda

Cavendish University held a Scientific and Blended Virtual Graduation on Thursday, May 28 at Speke Resort Munyonyo and it was broadcast live on NBS television and other online platforms, attracting a viewership of over 4.2 million worldwide.

The 9th graduation was presided over virtually by the Chancellor H.E. Benjamin Mkapa from Tanzania. A total of 809 students graduated with certificates, bachelor's degrees and post graduate degrees.

This was the first graduation of such kind in Uganda and the third in East Africa since the outbreak of COVID19 that has caused lockdown in many countries across the world. Attendance in the graduation was strictly by invitation and few students were invited to represent others.

The function started at 10am and lasted for three hours. The Commencement Speaker was Ms. Doris Akol, the former Commissioner General at URA and Rt. Hon. Rebecca Kadaga, Speaker of Parliament was the guest of honour.

The theme of the graduation was "Research & Innovation as tools to achieve Growth & Development." The graduation was postponed from March 27 to May 28, 2020, citing COVID-19 pandemic as the major reason for the postponement.

The university conducted a Graduation Survey in April. A sample of 500 graduating students participated in this survey and according to Mr. Fredrick Mufta, Sales & Marketing Director, 72 per cent of the students preferred a virtual graduation while others preferred to have the traditional in-person ceremony at a time when this public health crisis is over.

The graduation was described as

scientific because it observed the scientific guidelines of the Ministry of Health and the World Health Organisation (WHO) such as social distancing (over a two- metre radius), use of face masks, taking a short duration (maximum two hours), using a wide venue with sufficient ventilation that permits the flow of natural air, permitting few participants (not exceeding 20 people), sanitising the entire venue and provision of sanitary facilities to the participants on entry and exit.

In his address, the University Chancellor H.E. Benjamin Mkapa challenged the graduands to embrace Innovation as Tools for Growth and Development. "I know that innovation is what will make the difference between today and tomorrow if the future is to be better than the present," H.E Mkapa said adding that: "There is not a single organisation in the world today that isn't searching for innovative ways to improve its productivity, sustainability, efficiency and effectiveness. Your own employability and career development is thus dependent on your ability to convert your acquired knowledge into better ways of doing business, improving service delivery and scaling big ideas."

H.E Mkapa also advised the graduands to work hard, be focused, continue learning and be disciplined if they are to succeed because success is not automatic.

In his speech, Prof. John Francis Mugisha the Vice Chancellor justified why the graduation was necessary. He said: "The purpose of holding this scientific and virtual graduation is to enable our examined students obtain their academic documents to be able to secure jobs, promotions at the work place, job security or pursue further education and make contributions to the world." Graduating now rather than later will enable graduates to compete more favourably for any available jobs, promotions, and survive better the post- COVID-19 employment environment, which is likely to be characterised by new job scarcity, retrenchments, and the like.

Rt. Hon. Rebecca Kadaga commended Cavendish University for continuing to operate even when all education institutions including universities went into a shutdown world

over. "I am reliably informed that Cavendish University Uganda was already prepared with an educational online platform and I take this opportunity to congratulate you. This sets you apart as a university preparing students for the future."

Rt. Hon. Kadaga further advised the graduands to work hard in order to succeed. "To succeed, you need hard work, unwavering commitment, steadfast concentration, excellent collaborative skills as you study in teams and great intellectual abilities to satisfy stringent requirements of a rigorous academic system," She said.

Prof. Mugisha also highlighted the achievements of the university, for example, being the best in the 2019 interuniversity debate in Uganda, being voted the best private university in Uganda of which the Cavendish University awarded a golden medal by the Consumer Choice Award. The university also improved on her ranking from the 17th position to 11th position in a span on just one year.

How then will the academic documents (Transcripts and Certificates) be verified and delivered?

Upon graduation, the university will publish the names of the graduates on the University Website.

The university will also send soft copies of the academic documents to the graduates via email; the Certificate, Transcript and copy of the graduation book will be delivered by courier to the Office of the Education Attaché at the various embassies in Kampala for countries with CUU International graduates or arrange collection from the University by the graduates in Uganda; and the academic documents can be verified using the Certificate Verification Service (CVS) link on the university website.

However, the university also clarified that no further graduation fees shall be payable by the students who choose to "walk" at the next graduation ceremony and that graduation fees for the 9th Graduation Ceremony will be maintained to cover the costs related to, among others, certificate and transcript printing and delivery, as well as, the CVS service.

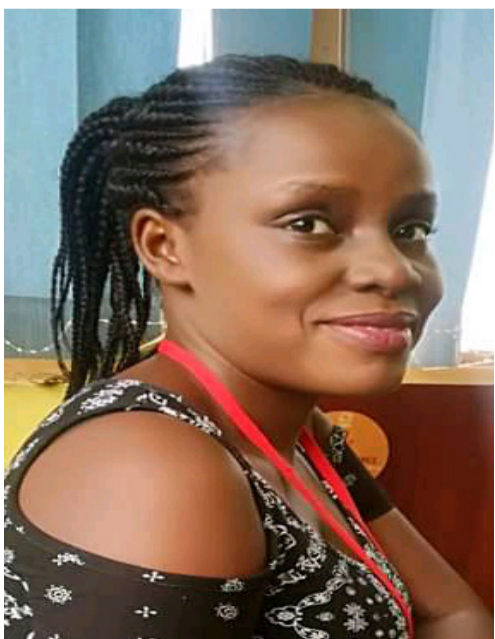

it is not a must for one to go to the gym for physical exercise because one can do it in their room, compound and any place that has space.

He also advised on workout dress code, saying that one should not put on a tight dress or pair of pants when he or she is going to the gym or any other place for workouts. One should instead put on a free outfit that makes him or her comfortable when working-out. People who workout are at a lower risk of dying early.

Mr. Muhumuza, however, advises that every person should workout for a good health. He says that physical education should even be made compulsory in schools so that the students and teachers can be physically fit and healthy.

Besides being physically fit, Mr. Muhumuza said that working-out has helped people like him get jobs. He said that if physical education is made compulsory in schools, they (gym instructors) will get jobs in schools to teach body fitness lessons.

Working out and following a strict nutritional regimen to achieve a perfect physical form is both art and science while lifting weights and engaging in other fat busting and muscle revealing exercise is an important part of discipline, but eating the right way maybe even a bigger piece of puzzle.



To help people make healthy lifestyle changes, Mr. Muhumuza said that: "People should set specific, progressive achievable weight and exercise target and prescribing lifestyle intervention programs that can provide appropriate supports. Using smart phones or watches (smart) applications or other wearable devices that provide activity feedback as well as applications that help people track food intake can be helpful to keep people motivated for a healthy lifestyle."
